
Skinny



THE BIG TEEN TITLES INTERVIEW



Broughton High students Jason Jarvis, Andrew Irving and Bradley Whyte visited Stewart's Melville College and joined Stewart's Melville students Alexander Rhodes, Hamish Garratt and James Stuart to interview Tom Palmer – and here's what they asked.

- Q How do you come up with ideas? Do you just lie in bed and think of something and get writing?
- It's usually stuff I'm obsessed with, like football, and crime – a lot of my books are about crime in football. So they come from being annoyed by match fixing and things like that. But with the rugby one, that came from rugby league and rugby union and how they are always slagging each other off, and I wanted to write one where a boy had to choose between playing rugby league and rugby union. Where I live in Yorkshire people play both and are always having a go at each other so I though it'd be good to put one person through that wringer. My books are usually about real stuff or stuff I have read in the news.
- Which is your favourite book that you've written?
- A Probably one called *Offside* which is about a young footballer in Ghana who is illegally trafficked to Europe. And a lot of that goes on, but also his family are fair-trade cocoa

bean farmers and so I went to Ghana and I met footballers, and I went to a fair-trade area and found out about their lives. I am proud of it most because it represents something bad that was happening that I wanted to raise awareness of.

- In all your books do you always go to experience what happens first-hand? In your latest book, in the manuscript you gave us, you said you slept in the football stadium to get experience. Have you done that for all your books?
- Yes. I try too. Firstly, I think it's good to try and get it accurate but also because I like to do interesting stuff. I wanted to camp on the pitch because I thought it would be really exciting. It wasn't – it was quite dull! It wasn't scary or anything like that. I went to Ghana to see the cocoa-bean growing. I went to Russia – I was writing about Russian billionaires so I went to a posh hotel when billionaires were there so I could watch them. I try to put myself in the position my characters would find themselves in. Because it's fun!
- What made you want to be an author?
 Reading probably. I got into reading quite late because my mum encouraged me to read about football, and so I got into reading at about 17 and once I started liking books I wanted to write my own. I looked up to authors and I wanted to be like them.
 What did you read when you were our age?
 Nothing! Seriously, I hated reading.
 What book eventually got you into reading?
- The Illustrated History of Leeds United (everyone laughs when I tell them this!) I used to write at the end of each season,

there were a few blank pages I used to write stuff in – that was my first ever writing. I used to write really bad stuff about how bad Leeds were!

- Q Do you ever write stories about your own real experiences?
- A Yes there's lots of stuff I put in my stories about stuff that's really happened. If something hasn't happened to me I'll try and make it happen by, like I said, going there. It is all fiction but there are bits in there of memories of mine. In *Ghost Stadium*, that draws on a very strange experience I had when I was about 18 which was sort of ghostly, not so much what happened but how I felt – absolutely paralysed with fear. It was useful to have had that horrible experience.
- Q The *Foul Play* books are part football, part detective books, and the *Squad* books are part football, part spy. Do you have any other combinations you might use in the future?
- That's a good question! I haven't thought A of one yet, but I suppose the new series is a new combination. Have you ever made those Airfix kits, the plastic planes that you glue together? My daughter is nine, and we've made a couple of planes together, and it gave me the idea of combining making plastic models with a story where you jump into the past or the future - a boy ends up finishing a Spitfire and the minute he finishes it he ends up in a Spitfire in the Battle of Britain and he's got to get out. And then there'll be a book set in a Lancaster bomber, one in a Chinook. So that's kind of combining my interest in model aeroplanes with my interest with the past. But no more football combos. I'd guite like to do a boarding school/rugby one.
- Who's your favourite author?
 I really like Anthony Horowitz and I like Mal Peet who writes good football, sort of ghost football books. But I have been reading Roald Dahl's biography recently and he is really interesting because he was a fighter pilot in the Second World War and he was a spy in America in the 1940s and he was such a fascinating man so I am interested in him as a person – I love his books too, but not as much as other books.
- Q When your books weren't being published, did you ever feel like giving up?
- No, I didn't, once I got started. I didn't think I'd do it as a job; I just wanted to see if I could write a book and get it published, I didn't think it would be a job job. I always tried and then if I knew it was bad or I couldn't get it published, I'd try at something else and keep going. I think that the key to it is never give up – if you've got something you really want to do, don't give up.
- Q Have you ever thought about becoming a sports journalist?

- I'd like to but I think it's a very different skill, I think it'd be hard for me to get into because there's so many people doing it. I could probably get into feature writing from where I am now. That's quite intense, you're told what to write and when to write it, and it's got to be done that day. I like the way I can write things over a few months, I don't particularly fancy writing to a strict deadline to be honest. I'd rather watch Leeds and scream and shout!
- Q Do you ever wake up in the morning after you've had a dream, and just think, I've just got to write that!
- A Yes! If there is a problem in the book and I don't know what the solution is, often I will wake up and just know what it is. I'm not big on all that stuff but I think your unconscious can work stuff out for you and deliver it for you without you having to think it through consciously. It is like you put something in and it comes out a few days later, and I completely believe in that, but not in a ridiculous way.
- Under what conditions do you write? I wrote on a train last night, I'll write on a train tonight. I might write in a café in Edinburgh later today. Wherever I am I'll

write – I'll write in Leeds tomorrow, have a cup of coffee. But when I am at home I'll do it at my desk. I have a desk in the back room and I'll just do it there. But I am rubbish at writing at home because unfortunately there's always FIFA in the next room. For instance, I'll decide I'll write for half an hour then I'll play one game on FIFA, but I end up playing for half an hour on FIFA and not writing! So it's better when I am out!

- Q Have you ever stayed up really late writing a book?
- No, I'm rubbish at writing after 8pm; I can't do anything except play FIFA.
- Q Who is the first person you go to once you've just finished a book?
- A My wife, and she goes through it and she'll absolutely rip it to shreds and two thirds of what she'll say will be spot on. Also, I'm in a writing group so we'll show each other our stuff and I occasionally show my stuff to a class in a school. It's great – the more feedback I get the better. My Spitfire book, ten people have read it already and it has really helped to make it a better book. Much better.
- Q Have you ever been in the middle of a story and then you have run out of ideas?

Yes! I was writing one about a prison camp А set in the future where the children had to escape or at the end of the year they would be killed. So when they were 16 they would be killed, because the people in charge could kill 16-year-olds but not anyone under that, and so the children had to escape. I wrote about twenty thousand words and it was going all right, but I just thought it wasn't working. I had researched it for three months and then written it for three, while doing other things, and it just wasn't up to it, so I stopped. If you are bored writing, stop writing because it is going to bore the reader.

- Q What has been the biggest success for your books? For example, an award or something?
- A Sadly I have not won anything yet, although I got shortlisted for the Blue Peter Award. The biggest success is when you get an email or a tweet from a parent who says 'My child has always hated reading, and thanks to you he has just gone to bed early because he wants to read.' Something like that is ace – that is better than awards and all that, isn't it?

- What made you become a writer?
- At school I was pretty rubbish at maths and science but good at English, and loved to read. As a child I had a dream to write, and although it's taken me a while, I'm really happy to be doing what I'm doing now – writing for others to read.
- How do you start when writing a book?
 I usually start with a character in mind and go with the flow at the beginning. Sometimes people I meet or know give me inspiration. I have friend who is in the Samaritans, where she is trained to listen and not give advice, and that's why I used

- What did you do before writing?


the cemetery, who over the night ahead will each tell him how they came to their often terrifying deaths.




Rise of the Dark One
