Notes from school review workshops

Currie Primary School: Workshop held on Wednesday 17 January 2018

The following notes are separated by discussion group and have been categorised by subject discussed. The discussion group notes were taken by different council officers and in some cases by group members. The representations below are as faithful to the original notes as possible. Accordingly, the written approach of the notes taken at each discussion group will vary. None of the notes taken are verbatim. We have not included comments which may identify an individual who is not a Council Officer.

Discussion Group One

| Currie Primary School catchment would go to Balerno Community High instead of Currie Community High when South West Edinburgh High opens August 2022. | Pupils that are already in primary school should be guaranteed a place in the secondary school that applies at the time they started primary school. This will resolve a lot of people's concerns about all the proposed options. For example, this would stop pupils already in primary school being split from their friends if they have to go to different secondary schools. |

| Retain all schools on their existing sites refurbishing or rebuilding as require. | Keeps community together Preserves local facilities; The three high schools could work together more – become centres of excellence e.g. WHEC (technical focus), Balerno Community High School (sport focus) with pupils moving between sites. - Big schools class sizes too big, lesser relationship with pupils, not flexible to accommodate future growth.
- Would like evidence about larger schools and why they could be better.
- There would not be space for Woodlands School if a super school as built on the site
- How will an amalgamation effect the teaching body?
- Could sport or other facilities be retained at Balerno to reduce what is required at Currie site?
- Traffic concerns from having such a large sprawling catchment area.

- Why are the local community not sending their children there?
- The group would like more information on super schools.
- You should not build new schools that will be at capacity from day one!
- Pupils could become "lost" or anonymous within a larger/super school.

| | Clarity on building conditions, space available for redevelopment etc would also help inform decisions. |
| | What happens to the children during the refurb / rebuild process? |
| | Currie Primary School has a very strong sense of community, we don't want this false divide (splitting catchments). This strong community spirit leads on to the secondary school |
| | Really good transition, allows children to expand social groups / friends |



- Importance of activities provided outside of the school environment (swimming etc) means that children will have already attended the High School in some capacity and won't be as scared / nervous when they move to bigger school
- The High School is a Community high school. Lots of events are held, so kids from the whole catchment come for activities, meaning they know each other before they start at the school.
- Children group together and walk to school. Parents have also attended the school – reason why they came back to the area, for the sense of community.
- Parents know each other through evening classes etc too see each other regularly and interact. If these events end up hosted elsewhere then this will be harder to achieve.
- Was suggested that a new school could create a new community hub.
- Currie is like a wee village. That's what I want for my child if high school goes then we'll need to look elsewhere.
- Balerno is very much a community too.
- Older neighbours also have a view not just about the school but the wider community. Community is static, solid.
- Regarding roll size, other schools in the city have larger rolls but we wanted a community high.
- Community is created from the kids up.
- Could those within WHEC be redistributed to other school's undercapacity and closer to their community?



Open Discussion

- Risk that building / refurbishing an old building just means adapting if (might prevent creative thinking in design).
- Currie Community High School currently has access issues –
 bottleneck, problems with right of way etc. Could a new entrance be
 built or pedestrianize this section (although noted there are three
 different ways to access)?
- Problems of WHEC being pushed on us.
- Wester Hailes some people choose to come to Currie Primary School (so travel against the traffic etc for a better school).
- Could there be a joint primary and high school on the Currie Community High School site?
- How are community facilities in Currie and WHEC used at the moment? Where are the facts and figures? Is there enough resource in the new location for demand?
- If building a new school elsewhere, what would be provided on the old Currie Community High School site? How would you provide community facilities?
- So many new houses being built puts pressure on other services.
- Doctors are oversubscribed, facilities would be limited if you remove the school the facilities on offer wouldn't be there.
- Understanding the infrastructure to support a new school / proposed changes would help thinking.
 - o What does it mean for the area?
 - O What will it bring to area?
- In 60 years, how will the community have changed?



| Woodlands School | Not even mentioned in the initial letter. Purpose built school and important for those with additional needs. Catchment is for the whole of Edinburgh. |

Discussion Group Four

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| Published Proposals | This will all cause (and is causing) a lot of disruption and will have (and is having) an effect on the children. It will cause anxiety for children. Therefore, the sooner we can implement the better. |

There would be the benefit for Woodlands School not moving. We don't want to isolate the children here. Some children have autism. The negatives included: It would be swapping the problem to Balerno. They might be in opposition to this. Other discussion points: How will numbers work? Community and catchment for this option – there was some debate around this. The majority of the table were ok with including Dean Park, Currie and Nether Currie primary schools only in this catchment area for this proposed option. However, there was one person opposed to the exclusion of Juniper Green. It would be important to keep the current attainment levels of Currie Community High School. 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| Published Proposals | One parent noted that under the published proposals they'd have children at three separate schools, which was undesirable as it would create problems logistically and reduce their opportunity to fully engage with each school if they had to spread their time across three different schools. If parental engagement is linked to attainment then a sibling guarantee is required to ensure siblings go to the same school so parents can engage with one school, rather than splitting their time over two or more schools. |
