## Clovenstone Primary School: Workshop held on Thursday 18 January 2018

## **Discussion Group**

Item	Discussion / Comments
Published Proposals	<ul> <li>Parent Councils will have four years to prepare and to work on bringing the communities together.</li> <li>Comments on social media by Currie community have raised concerns with parent; will my child be "picked on" coming from the WHEC catchment?</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Agreed that this is parents' initial reaction and everyone "jumps on the bandwagon".</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Familiarity and transition from Clovenstone Primary School to WHEC – Head Teachers at primary schools and WHEC know the pupils by name, how will this be retained?</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>There are a couple of pupils outwith the Clovenstone catchment, would they have to go to Forrester High School? Can they make an out of catchment application? – (Yes)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>My friend has heard from someone that was at the Currie Primary School consultation "that Currie are not standing for this so it will not be happening".</li> </ul>



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Summary of Published Proposals:	Excellent community facilities.
	<ul> <li>Teachers would know all the pupils meeting their individual needs.</li> </ul>
	WHEC's attainment level has improved.
	<ul> <li>All Recognised that WHEC is a much-improved school.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>All agreed and acknowledged that WHEC required to be refurbished or re- built as it is in poor condition.</li> </ul>
	Geographically WHEC is positioned well for Wester Hailes catchment.
	<ul> <li>WHEC catchment is geographically a small area but has a lot more households.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Parents were surprised to hear that only 49% of pupils go to WHEC. Why are parents not sending their children to WHEC as this is their catchment?</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Concern that the community facilities need to be retained within this area.</li> <li>WHEC is widely used by the community for leisure facilities and night classes.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Andy Gray, Head of Schools and Lifelong Learning confirmed that community facilities would be retained on the existing WHEC site.</li> </ul>
WHEC would amalgamate with Currie Community High School in August 2022 upon the completion of a new South West Edinburgh high school.	<ul> <li>Some concern raised if WHEC amalgamated into a larger school, some pupils would become lost and their needs not met.</li> </ul>



Potential sites at Curriemuirend, north of Baberton and Murrayburn identified.	Site option 1
	Is this site big enough?
	All agreed that this was the best site option.
	<ul> <li>Discussed Muir Wood site and agreed that this would be a preferable option to rebuilding on Currie Community High School site</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>All agreed that the option of building a new school on existing Currie Community High School site was not an acceptable proposal.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Agreed that there needs to be "a middle ground" as there would be potential divide between Currie and WHEC pupils.</li> </ul>
	Pupils from Wester Hailes would continue to be seen differently.
	Currie parents don't want their children to mix with WHEC.
	<ul> <li>It's within walking distance, takes approximately 20 minutes or the number 44 bus service.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>If pupils did not want to stay at school for lunch, there are plenty shops / facilities in the Juniper Green area.</li> </ul>
	Site option 2
	This site is situated North of Baberton, Currie pupils would need to walk down Donkey Lane, on the north side of the railway.
	This would be manageable.
	Site option 3
	• This site is situated at Murrayburn and is on the edge of the catchment.
	This was the least preferred option.

Other comments	<ul> <li>Leisure facilities are important for the WHEC community.</li> <li>If facilities remain on WHEC site the swimming pool and changing rooms need to be upgraded.</li> <li>WHEC is not push-chair friendly.</li> <li>Money needs to be spent, who would run it?</li> <li>Edinburgh Leisure: Andy Gray, Head of Schools and Lifelong Learning explained Edinburgh Leisure and their relationship to the council.</li> <li>If WHEC get the facilities and the use of it, priority needs to be maintained for them.</li> <li>Comments about the WHEC Feedback Form raised and that time-out</li> </ul>
