#### **HELP IS AT HAND**

The gardens at Saughton Park are being given a helping hand by various volunteers, trainees and students.

We are pleased to welcome volunteer gardeners Amie Routledge and Alexandra Linton-Smith. Amie is a Landscape Design student at SRUC and brings with her a wealth of planning experience. She is keen to get hands on experience of working in a botanical garden. Alexandra is an RHS student at the Edinburgh Royal Botanical Gardens and wants to balance the theory that she is learning there with practical skills at Saughton.

The Charge Hand gardener Alan McMahon has been very impressed with them so far. In addition to the help that he is getting, he is also ensuring that Amie and Alexandra both learn from his wide knowledge of plants by running regular plant identification tests!

Skills Path, an organisation who offer training and support for adults with mild learning disabilities, now have two of their trainees also working in the garden. Along with their worker Lorna, Kevin and Oliver have been helping Alan the Charge Hand gardener carry out a range of jobs in the garden. Kevin and Oliver have quite a bit of horticultural experience already and Alan is helping them to learn and do even more.

Skills Path will be working with us over the next 6 months to help develop our thinking around the subject of therapeutic gardening which is an intrinsic part of the park Master Plan.

And if that's not enough, a group of pupils from Tynecastle High School S1 year group, who are undertaking the Junior Awards Scotland programme, are about to start volunteering in the Park and will be helping Park Ranger Matt Creran with various tasks such as litter picking and pruning.

All very valuable work in keeping the park and gardens beautiful and clean!
