## **GOOD TURNOUT ON 16 DECEMBER**

Thank you to everyone who came along to our consultation event on 16 December. It was a good turnout with 35 attending the workshops during the day and over 50 attending the public exhibition on what was a wet and windy night.

#### **DEVELOPING THE MASTER PLAN**

We showcased our initial thoughts about the layout of the buildings within the park at this consultation event and discussed your ideas on what sort of events and markets you wanted to see in the park. We also got a better idea of the kind of café offering you think there should be.

There was a consensus agreement from all those who attended to cluster the café, community space, the Caley and Gardener's office space and the Winter Garden to the west of the park, using the derelict stable block and yard as the inspiration for development in this area, as show on page 2.

There was also agreement by the majority of people who attended to the location of the historic bandstand, which we propose to restore back to its former glory, as shown on page 2. While not set in stone, this location will now be considered in more detail by the designers.

Above is the concept drawing showing the development of the old Stables and possible location for the bandstand. Below are two visualisations of how the court yard could be used as a market place and demonstration gardens. They are intended to provoke discussion rather than actual proposals.

The exhibition itself received a lot of press coverage, which is great and hopefully it has raised awareness even further ready for our major public consultation next March, when we want local and city wide residents to get involved and have their say about what's being proposed for the park.



### **LET'S LOOK BACK**

Missie



There was 1 wee dog called Missie who attended all meetings, slept on laps of the unwary and wormed her way into everyone hearts. We had 2 new project staff Linda and Pete who started in February and 3 pencils worn out in an hour by Kirsty while doing a visitor count on a busy Saturday! We put 8 new signs around the park and sent out 4 project newsletter to tell everyone what's been happening.



During summer 11 sweetcorn cobs were grown (and eaten) by Balgreen Primary School students, 500 children came to hunt Great Saughton Teddy Bears and 5000 wildflowers were planted by adults from Craighall Day Centre. We have discovered that 554 people visited our 7 Geocaches hidden in and around the Park and 100 junior archaeologists discovered the foundations of the old Saughtonhall.



Over the year we held 14 stakeholder workshops to get your help in defining and shaping the plans for the park, 353 of you completed visitor surveys and we found out that around 400,000 of you visit the park over a year and that most of you spend around 1 hour there. We met with 100 different groups, charities, organisations and delivery partners and 95 public meetings, events and activities were organised since the project started in February, the same as the number of fish living in the Winter Garden pond!!



The first historic reference to Saughton was 1128 and 2 influential and celebrated Victorian psychiatrists pioneered therapeutic gardening for their patients at Saughtonhall. In 1908 the Scottish National Exhibition opened at Saughton Park for 6 months and in 1984 the current Winter Garden was opened.



Thinking ahead to 2015 we will press the button on the 28<sup>th</sup> day of the 8th month and submit our application asking the Heritage Lottery Fund for 3.8 million pounds and 1000's of fingers will be crossed for good news this time next year.
