Evidence of inclusive engagement of service users and involvement findings		During 2018, consultation and engagement events have been held with BSL users across the city and beyond. A successful all-day walk-in weekend event was held in the city centre, staffed with colleagues from a range of council and health services. A BSL reference group made up of BSL users, parents of BSL users, BSL/English Interpreters and academics has also been established and has met regularly since work on the plan began. Information has also been published on the Council's website and social media pages and a closed Facebook group has been set up for BSL users to give their views and feedback on the plan.
Evidence of unmet need		Leaflets and information materials are usually only available in written English. This is problematic for some BSL users as English may be a second language or they may have low levels of English literacy. Feedback told us that the written information we provide can be overwhelming to some BSL users. Consultation indicates that BSL users would like to increase the volume of information available in BSL – either through BSL videos, through an interpreter, through ITS or

Following launch of the plan an options appraisal will be undertaken with support from procurement to help shape the future service delivery model for BSL interpretation services across the organisation, essentially where we will resource interpreters from. Both the Options Appraisal and Re-Procurement (if applicable) of

BSL Interpretation services will follow Scottish Government, UK government and EU Best Practice.

A communications plan was put together for development of the BSL Plan. The next steps after the plan is launched is to move towards implementing the actions and priorities of the BSL community. Again, a communications plan will be in place to ensure the community is kept up to date on progress and are able to engage with us with further feedback.

The Communications plan will include social media campaigns, led by the Council's communications' service. We will also work with our local BSL partner organisations to ensure those people who don't use social media and don't interact with the Council often are kept up to date.
