# **Equality, Health and Wellbeing and Human Rights**

#### Positive

- The community space should also help contribute to the target to reduce loneliness and social isolation as the space will be open to everyone.
- The plan also includes the creation of free play space on the site for children.
- Employability hub created to add to the community outreach in the area. Capital City Partnership (CCP) engage with and support other Edinburgh based employability organisations to support vulnerable individuals and those with protected characteristics in the city. CCP work closely with local employers to support those most in need.
- The NHS will offer an universal service with a focus on young families accessible to those in Leith. The location will offer improved flexibility and access through a drop in service and early intervention will allow for further signposting to meet additional service needs.
- Improving access to services, reducing inequality and supporting vulnerable individuals is one of the main aims of this project. Additional needs are being supported as they arise including support of those with low digital literacy to improve employability and support day to day life.
- New business space will be created through the installation of shipping containers to create artist space as well as support for local businesses in the creation of market space in the external section of the site.

# Negative

 Due to the age of the building there is no existing lift between floors. There is an asperation to install lift access in the future when budget allows. In the meantime, there are client meeting facilities and toilet provision on the ground floor.

CCP support long term unemployed to help shape and design services.

NHS Health Visitors will directly support families including single parents and vulnerable families.

Council employees based at this site will link in with supporting these services as well as supporting vulnerable groups falling into poverty.

All services will be universal and available to all.
