

**Literacy and English - Grammar**



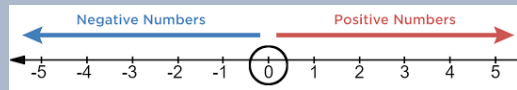
**Starter** - Read for **25 minutes a day**. Read a story, a newspaper, a comic that you have at home.

**Numeracy and Mathematics - Number**



**Starter:**

- Pick a number between 0 and -10.
- Count forwards from this number.
- Count backwards to get back to the number you started from

**Main challenge:**

- Make a number line to show your counting.
- Count up/down in 2s, 3s, etc.

**Health and Wellbeing- exercise**



- Play balloon volleyball with someone in your family.
- Suggestions: play on your knees, use one hand or only use your head!

**Literacy and English - Film review**



**Starter** - Think of a film you like. Talk about the film in English or in your home language with someone in your home.

**Main Challenge** - Write a review of this film. You can use the attached sheet. (page 3)

**Extra Challenge** - Record your 'Summary of plot' (page 4) on an iPad, phone or read it aloud.

**Numeracy and Mathematics - Decimal numbers**



- Roll a dice 3 times.
- Write down the numbers.  
e.g. 2 5 1
- Put a **decimal point** after the first number to have a number like this: 2.51.
- Describe each number e.g. 5 = 5 tenths.

**Challenge:**

- Repeat the activity 5 times.
- Order the numbers from smallest to largest?

**STEM- Making and using salt dough**



Design a **character** or **object** from your **reading book**.

You can **draw** it or make it using **salt dough**. Your **object** could be the **jewellery** worn by a **character** or a **building** in the story.

### Numeracy and Mathematics - Estimating



- Draw a **line**.

- Ask for another number and mark it on the number line. Repeat this a few more times.

### Expressive Arts - Music



- Ask these **questions** to your friends and family.  
What is your favourite **type** of music?  
Why do you like this type of music?  
How does it make you **feel**?  
Is it **connected** to your past?
- Listen to each piece of music.
- Do you like them too?

Persuasive writing is an important skill to develop. It can help us to **share our opinions** in a considered and thoughtful way. It also helps us to listen to and respect **other peoples' opinions**.

2. Use the following structure to help organise your ideas and opinions.

<p><b>Sentences starters:</b> In my opinion..... I feel that.... Some people think, Surely, The reason for this is...</p>	<p><b>My notes</b></p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Main section</b> - State your strongest argument first <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Use evidence/facts make your arguments and opinions strong</li> <li>- Use a new paragraph for different points</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
