Befriending, while there are a number of befrienders in the city, Safe Families are able to recruit befrienders with particular skill sets, such as Teachers, Doctors, Health Visitors etc. This is on a citywide basis and taps into a resource that CEC has not developed yet Overnight stays. Safe Families support and provide overnights stays where required. Safe Families support families who we would consider as being on the edge of care and this is something other projects have not developed.

We have in place a team of internal volunteers who will deliver the required family support. This also includes a contact email address for new referrals to be sent to. This also applies to any communication about existing and ongoing support required. The service area will encourage the incumbent provider to be involved along with service users and other stakeholders in the Whole Family Wellbeing Approach.
