1. Title of proposal

Re-tender for the Residential, Special Schools Framework.

2. What will change as a result of this proposal?

The overall strategy will change to align more with "The Promise". CEC are looking to put in place the right resources to support all Children and Young People (CYP) who have been identified as requiring care away from their own home, and to ensure such resources can provide "Close to Home" provisions, to ensure our CYP can retain their local connections and remain close to those relationships and environments with which they are familiar.

The framework specification and evaluations will align around the 5 foundations of Voice, Family, Care, People and Scaffolding and we will place a maximum of 50-mile boundary in and around the city and we will take forward those providers who can evidence local communities' connections and have a base of operations within the set boundary.

There may be a reduced number of providers being awarded a place on the Framework who have much closer ties to local communities in and around Edinburgh.

The existing placements out with the new 50-mile boundary will not be impacted

The new strategy underpinning the framework will reduce and effectively cease CYP being placed in care placements far away from home (Outside of Edinburgh). Under the new specification, providers will be required to evidence that they have local connections in the way of provisions and have a presence within the City of Edinburgh.

3. Briefly describe public involvement in this proposal to date and planned

On 31 January 2024 a Market Engagement event was held to discuss the potential new Framework. At this event the likelihood of an extension was explained, including what an extension may look like. There were 38 attendees from various providers from all over Scotland. There were a number of questions asked and answered on the day and more following the event. Since then, there have been various communications issued regarding the timeline of the extension and information published on Public Scotland Contract – Tender.

To achieve our <u>Edinburgh's My Home Strategy</u> we are working on Children's Services Redesign proposals. To inform the redesign, while working with, and including the perspectives of colleagues and service practitioners, we are speaking directly with children, young people, families and carers who are currently involved

with services or have had experience engaging with Children's Services. In collaboration with service teams and partners, we are finding ways for service users to participate.
