REPORT

By the Chief Constable to the Police Committee of the Burgh of Leith, on Crimes and Offences Reported to and Investigated by the Police, with other details connected with the duties of the Police, for the Year ending 31st December 1897.

THE tabulated information required by the Department of Judicial Statistics is this year much more elaborate than in former years, and the information regarding the individuals apprehended or cited by the Police is much fuller. Although there is not much of the information required in previous years omitted, yet it is so placed that it is difficult to compare with past years.

The Burgh during the year has been free from any very serious crime, and there has been a decrease in the number of crimes and offences reported to the Police, and also in the number of persons apprehended or cited. The decrease has been in Breaches of the Peace, &c., and minor Police offences. The decrease in "Drunk and Incapable, and not having a proper person to take charge of them," is 15.

The number of crimes and offences reported to the Police was 2830, compared with 3041 in the previous year—decrease, 211. For these crimes and offences, 2682 persons were apprehended and 484 persons were cited, making a total of 3166 persons apprehended or cited, compared with 3370 in the previous year—a decrease of 204 persons. This decrease is more than accounted for in the fewer number of persons cited, the apprehensions being 5 more this year than last. There were 30 persons apprehended for the criminal authorities of other jurisdictions and handed over to them, and not included in these Returns.

365 of those apprehended or cited were oftener than once before the Police Court on a separate charge during the year. The repeated appearances of those 365 individuals make them stand as 987 persons in these Returns.

This reduces the number of separate individuals to 2544.

Of the persons brought before the Court during the year, 1213 had been previously convicted of some crime or offence; and of these, 268 had been once previously convicted, 146 had been twice, 97 had been three times, 330 had been from four to ten times, 167 had been from eleven to twenty times, 187 had been from twenty-one to fifty times, and 18 had been from fifty-one to one hundred times.

1700 persons were drunk when apprehended; of these, 1208 were males and 492 females; and of these, 1090—viz., 781 males and 309 females—were drunk and incapable, and had no suitable person to take care of them.

Of those brought before the Court, 134—viz., 131 boys and 3 girls—were under 12 years of age, and 190—viz., 180 boys and 10 girls—were 12 and under 16 years of age. The charges against these juveniles were principally petty acts of theft, acts of malicious mischief, and annoying people by playing on the streets. Of juvenile offenders under 16 years of age, 7 were found wandering and without proper guardianship, 2 beyond the control of parents, 4 frequenting the company of reputed thieves, 1 begging, and 4 for theft—total, 18—were sent to an Industrial School; and 2 for begging, 6 for theft, and 1 for fraud—total, 9—were sent to a Reformatory School.

Of the total number of persons dealt with during the year, which includes 5 persons who were undisposed of at the end of 1896, 41 were tried in the High Court or in the Sheriff Court, after having been committed till liberated in due course of law; 3121 were disposed of summarily in the Sheriff or Police Court; and there were 9 whose cases were undisposed of at the end of the year. Of the 3121 disposed of summarily, 74 were tried in the Sheriff Court, 2579 in the Police Court, 446 forfeited bail for non-appearance, proceedings were dropped against 14, and 8 were remitted to the naval and military authorities.

Of the 2653 tried in the Sheriff and Police Courts, 2605 were convicted, 14 were acquitted, the charges against 30 were withdrawn, and 4 were sent to an Industrial School.

Of the 2605 convicted, 136 were sent to prison without the option of a fine, 1488 were fined with the alternative of imprisonment, 9 were sent to a Reformatory, 36 were whipped, 11 put under caution, and 925 admonished.

Of the 136 who were sent to prison without the option of a fine, 6 were sent 1 day and under, 5 were sent 3 days and over 1 day, 35 were sent 7 days and over 3 days, 37 were sent 14 days and over 7 days, 37 were sent 1 month and over 14 days, and 16 were sent 60 days and over 1 month.

Of the 1488 who were fined with the alternative of imprisonment, 697 paid before going to prison, 61 paid during imprisonment, and 730 suffered imprisonment in default of paying the fine; and of those 1488, 682 were fined 5s. and under, 517 under 10s. and over 5s., 247 under 20s. and over 10s., 37 under 40s. and over 20s., 1 under £5 and over 40s., and 4 over £5.

82 of the persons dealt with by the Police during the year—53 males and 29 females—were over 60 years of age.

The persons apprehended or cited for crimes and offences committed in the different Wards of the Burgh were:—First Ward, 663, as compared with 632 in the previous year—increase, 31; Second Ward, 601, as compared with 683 in the previous year—decrease, 82; Third Ward, 1301, as compared with 1387 in the previous year—decrease, 86; Fourth Ward, 403, as compared with 414 in the previous year—decrease, 11; Fifth Ward, 198, as compared with 254 in the previous year—decrease, 56.

The amount of fines imposed in the Police Court was £703, 19s., of which £333, 10s. 6d. was paid, and to this has to be added £154, 10s. forfeited pledges, being, together, £488, 0s. 6d. recovered.

The amount recovered as fines and forfeited pledges last year was £478, 4s.

76 fatal accidents and sudden deaths were reported to and investigated by the Police, and reported on by them to the Procurator Fiscal.

385 strayed children were taken care of by the Police and restored to their parents; of those 323 were at the Town Hall and 62 were at Newhaven.

923 premises were found by the Police open or insecurely shut.

851 dwelling-houses temporarily unoccupied were looked after by the Police—287 were at the Town Hall and 564 at Newhaven.

425 reports were made to the Burgh Surveyor of dangerous places on the streets, &c.

106 special permissions were granted to hotel-keepers and publicans to keep open their premises on special occasions after 11 P.M.

There are 311 premises certified by the Magistrates for the sale of exciseable liquor—viz., 7 hotels, 130 public-houses, 136 licensed grocers, 2 wine and beer licenses, and 36 wholesale dealers. This is 2 public-

houses, 1 licensed grocer, and 1 wholesale dealer more than last year, and 1 wine and beer license less than last year.

The census of vagrants, beggars, and migratory poor taken on 27th June and 26th December last, showed that on the former date there were 103, and on the latter date 61 such persons within the Burgh.

There were 31 dogs seized by the Police during the year, in terms of section 390 of the "Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892." Of these 13 were destroyed, as no owner could be found for them; 14 were claimed by their owners, who had to pay £1 for their keep; and 4 were sold for 15s.

The Police Force was inspected on 14th October by Captain Monro, Her Majesty's Inspector of Constabulary for Scotland.

There have been 24 changes in the Force during the year—1 died, 1 retired through ill-health, 18 resigned their appointments, and 4 were dismissed.
